

Tuesday 7th February 2023

At 7.30 p.m. in Lecture Theatre D, Central Teaching Hub. Lecture by Dr. Heather Stewart, British Geological Survey. Title: "Exploring Hades: geomorphology and sediments of the deepest places on Earth"



Summary:

The deepest parts of the ocean are one of the final remaining frontiers of discovery on our planet. Much of the deep ocean is unmapped and draws in explorers, scientists, cartographers, and environmentalists, keen to discover its secrets. Heather Stewart from the British Geological Survey has been lucky enough to participate on a number of expeditions to explore the deepest seafloors and will share some of what these diverse expedition teams have learned.



Heather specializes in characterising the geology and physical character of the seabed and sub-seabed. She applies expertise in complementary fields including habitat mapping (in support of the UK & UK Overseas Territory Marine Protected Area network) and offshore renewables (production of 3D geological models).


