Liverpool Geological Society Lecture

Tuesday 31st October

Lecture by Dr Michael Burn (Liverpool John Moores University)

Title: On the interpretation of natural archives of Atlantic tropical cyclone activity



Summary:

One of the biggest challenges for hurricane scientists is to predict how Atlantic tropical cyclones will respond to human-induced climate change during the 21st Century so that regional governments can prepare appropriate climate mitigation strategies. Climate models rely on meteorological records to understand how storm activity has responded to climate change since the mid-nineteenth Century; however, natural archives are needed to detect changes in the variability of storms over longer time scales. In this talk, I will compare the different approaches taken to reconstruct Late Holocene Atlantic storm activity and discuss their application to better constrain climate model projections of hurricane activity for the 21st Century.

Exhibitors include museums, universities, and geological societies, with fossil & mineral displays, books, maps, photographic competition entries, geological artists, ceramicist & jewellery makers, and activities for both children and adults alike. This year there will also be:

- a special exhibition of two originals of the most important maps in the history of geology the Smith and Greenough Maps
- a unique talk on the Geology of Hogwarts.

Geologists' Association: Geology from your Sofa

Geology from your Sofa for October 2023 has been adopted by Warwickshire Geological Conservation Group. It has the theme: How the forming and breakup of Pangea has dominated the geology of Warwickshire. The site includes virtual fieldtrips covering the following Triassic boundaries:

- Lias: The Hidden Wonders of Burton Dassett led by Norman Dutton.

 Burton Dassett Hills Country Park is a much loved place to spend recreation time. Walkers, cyclists and family groups with a picnic can enjoy the panoramic views and the sheltered hollows for playing and relaxing. Many are unaware of the industrial heritage and geological record that can be seen all around as revealed in this short video.
- Lias: Blockley Brickpit led by Jon Radley & Ray Pratt.

Located in the heart of the Gloucestershire Cotswolds, Northcot Bricks have been using the local Charmouth Mudstone in the production of facing bricks. This Brickpit is a site of numerous high-quality fossils of significant scientific value.

- Mid Triassic: Helsby Formation, Warwick Castle, Warwick led by Jon Radley.

 This is a geological education video recorded in the field discussing the Helsby sandstone, (aka Warwick sandstone), and its geological setting.
- Mid-Triassic Helsby Formation, Guys Cliffe, Warwick led by Stuart Burley.
 A 31-minute geology educational video looking at the Helsby Sandsone at Guys Cliffe, Warwickshire.
 Stuart Burley describes how to make sense of sedimentary features in fluvial systems.
- Lower Triassic: Chester Formation, Roundberry Quarry, Warwickshire led by Ray Pratt.

 This 20 minute geology educational video discusses the geological conditions that led to the deposition of the Chester Formation (Bunter Pebble Beds) here in Warwickshire.
